I'd like to wish everyone a happy, healthy New Year 2023! It is nice to be back to school after a nice break. I hope everyone was able to spend quality time with their loved ones.

This month we will be learning about Martin Luther King Jr. which ties in nicely with our Religion topics (friends, fairness, and the Golden Rule: treat others the way you want to be treated). Catholic Schools week will begin January 29-February 4, and is always filled with fun events.

Our Social Studies unit will be on "Community Helpers" for the month of January. We will discuss different jobs in our community and the character qualities necessary to be successful at work. If you are interested in visiting our classroom as a guest speaker/reader to tell how you help in our community, please email me. The time I have allotted is at 12:00-12:30 Monday through Friday. You may show/share briefly what you do and we can prep a coloring page.

In our Wonders program, we will be focusing on the following skills:

Social/Emotional learning: task persistence, managing emotions, prosocial behavior with adults,

Identity and belonging

Phonics/Spelling/Handwriting: Nn/Cc/Oo/Dd

Phonological Awareness: rhyme, isolation, sound segmentation, blending, counting syllables

High Frequency Words: and, go, do, you

Genre: fiction/ informational text: Non-fiction/ realistic fiction

Reading skills/strategies: key details, character, setting, events, ask and answer questions

In Math, we will finish Chapter 4: Numbers 0-10 and begin Chapter 5: Numbers to 31. The "base-ten" concept will be introduced and very important for your child to understand for their future progress in math. We will continue to work on number formation, order and recognition of the numbers from 0-31.

In Science, we will explore how temperature can change water, weather and seasons. We will end this unit with a "Show and Share". I will divide the class into: Winter, Spring, Summer and Fall. Your child will be asked to bring in an item from home that represents their season. For example, mittens might represent "winter"; acorns might represent "fall". It should be fun! I will send home their season the last week of January.
