Fine Motor/Writing Skills

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Arts and crafts are a great way for your child to develop and enhance their fine motor skills. We encourage you to cut, glue and decorate! Some specific suggestions include:

- 1. Bead Making Kits Lacing a necklace or bracelet one bead at a time helps to develop both fine motor skills and hand-eye coordination.
- 2. Play-Dough Rolling, molding and squeezingl Shape playdough to make letters, numbers and more,
- 3. Lacing Cards Lace each piece of string through various holes to create a picture.
- 4. Sand Digging and pouring sand from one container to the other. Use hands to shape and form sandcastles!

*Attached you will find lined handwriting paper. Please encourage your child to practice writing their first name. While writing with your child remind them to form their letters beginning at the top. Remember using your hand to guide your child's hand is okay, while they are developing those muscles!

<u>Math Skills</u>

Math is all around us! Practice sorting, classifying, adding and recognizing with the suggestions listed below.

- 1. Sort, sort! Have your child find new ways to sort their toys. Help them organize labeled bins, by color, shape, or size.
- 2. Count everywhere you go! Numbers are all around us and the more we acknowledge them the more confident your child will become with recognizing them on their own.
- 3. Cooking Following step by step directions, measuring, and counting ingredients allows your child to enhance numerous math skills.
- 4. Number writing Practice writing numbers with paint, chalk, markers, pencils, and more.

*Attached you will find number tracing pages. Please review these numbers with your child and have them carefully trace each number. You will also find number flash cards that you may use for number recognition practice.

Reading Skills

READ, READ, READ! Please read with your child each and every day. We must constantly expose our children to the wonderful world of books! Children learn how to become readers through exposure. They are always watching and learning. If they see you reading they too will wish to be readers.


While reading, take the time to point out whom the author and/or the author and illustrator may be. Discuss the illustrations and ask questions. Some questions that you may ask are listed below:

- 1. What will happen next?
- 2. What happened at the beginning, middle and end of the story?
- 3. Can you name some of the characters of the story?
- 4. Where does the story take place? What is the setting?

Letter Recognition Skills

Please also use the uppercase letter flash cards to help sharpen letter recognition skills. Letter recognition plays an important role in our everyday routine.


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
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
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





Color, cut out the cards, and play a rhyming match game!













Color the crayons to match their labels.








Ten-Frame Grid Game


You Need:

Beans, cereal, pennies, or other objects for counters







